She deals with the history of formal and informal education, the comparative analysis of educational policies, school programs and textbooks and the relationship between identity and education, starting from the variables of gender, cultural, linguistic, and religious diversity.

Connecting - Call for Papers!! "Picturing Otherness. A historical perspective on diversity in children's literature (20th-21st Century)", Hamburg, 1st – 2nd March 2023

Otherness, diversity and self-recognition have been an essential, recurring element of children's literature since the times of ancient fairy tales. This tradition, however, does not translate to contemporary children's literature, as we often encounter a "predominantly middle-class, heterosexual, non-disabled, Anglophone and male world" (Crisp, T. & alt, 2016) in modern children's books. The conference aims to analyse the construct of "otherness" regarding the narratives aimed at childhood and adolescence, and to be an opportunity for debate, exchange, comparison and interdisciplinary reflection on children's literature and diversity.

Submit a paper-proposal (maximum 300 words) to the editorial staff by the 15th October 2022. All proposals must be accompanied by a short curriculum (200 words), and can be send to maria.lucenti@uni-hamburg.de. Abstracts should include the following information: Author(s), Affiliation as you would like to appear in the programme, E-mail address, Title of proposal. Text of proposal (including research question, methodology, research context), Selected bibliography with academic sources (3-5 references), Five keywords. All submissions are reviewed by the members of the Reading Committee. All abstracts and papers accepted for and presented at the conference must be in English. Paper presentations will be 20 minutes maximum followed by a 10 minutes discussion.

The conference is organized by members of the History of Education research group of the Faculty of Education, University of Hamburg, and with the support of the DFG: The Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft - German Research Foundation.



Guidance - Joint Doctoral Program

The joint doctoral program offers students the opportunity to earn a degree from two universities in different countries within one single project. In this program, the students are accepted for doctoral studies at both universities and are asked to balance the workload equally between the two partners.

The joint phd program is available at all faculties at Universität Hamburg. The faculty of education shares good relationships and experience with their strategic partner universities such as Macquarie University Sydney or Fudan University Shanghai.
